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General Rules and Regulations for Competitions

The following rules and regulations shall apply to ALL competitions held in the Newfoundland and Labrador Section of Skate Canada.

Host Sites

The host sites for all competitions shall be announced at the Annual General Meeting of Skate Canada Newfoundland and Labrador or as soon as possible thereafter.

Announcements

The host committee shall be responsible for the compilation and distribution of the respective competition announcement. The announcement shall include: competition dates, site (including ice surface measurements), categories, entry deadline date, and name of competition chairperson. Announcements for the Sectional Championships shall be distributed not later than 8 weeks prior to the date of the first category. Regional, Provincial and Provincial Synchro Announcements shall be distributed not later than 6 weeks prior to the date of the first category. The Junior Provincial Announcements shall be distributed not later than 4 weeks prior to the date of the first category. In addition the Provincial entry fee shall be decided and indicated to the Regional Host Committees before each Regional competition. The main method of distribution of announcements will be via e-mail and on the Section web site. All clubs should ensure that the Section office has a valid e-mail address for contact on record. If clubs wish to have a hard-copy of any announcement mailed to them they must contact the host committee well in advance of the announcement deadline.

Calculation of results

The CPC calculation method will be used wherever possible based on availability of officials and Skate Canada regulations. The One-By-One (OBO) calculation method shall be used for all other categories. The method of calculation shall be specified in competition announcements.

Composition of Teams

All dance and pair teams must be composed of a male and female (non-qualifying similar dance categories are permitted at Regional and Interclub competitions). When determining age categories, the age of the older partner is used.

Compulsory dances

Where a draw is required, this should be made prior to the start of the event by the technical representative, and posted prior to the start of competition.

Entry Forms

Designated entry forms shall be used for all qualifying competitions of Skate Canada Newfoundland and Labrador. These forms will be supplied to host committees by the Competitions and Awards chair for Skate Canada Newfoundland and Labrador. Incorrectly completed entry forms may be rejected and assessed a late penalty of up to double the normal entry fee. Proof of current Skate Canada membership must be submitted with entry (copy of Skate Canada membership card).

Age and test restriction

To clarify "before July 1 preceding the event" means that skaters born on July 1st skate as the age they were on June 30th. Thus a skater who turns 10 on July 1st skates as a 9-year old. Test eligibilities are considered similarly- i.e. tests must be completed prior to the date stated. Test levels refer to complete tests passed unless otherwise specified.

Officials Development and Technology Fee

\$5.00 per skater per competition (note that a skater competing in more than one category only has to pay the fee once). This fee must be submitted to the Section office by the competition hosts within 30 days of the completion of the event.

Late Entries

Late entries will be accepted at the discretion of the Technical Representative of the competition. Late entries shall not affect bye status of previously approved byes and shall not be accepted later than 48 hours prior to the start of the competition.

Practice Ice

Once registered for a competition, skaters shall use the official practice ice of the competition only (if provided). Use of ice other than the official practice ice shall result in disqualification. Practice ice will be provided at Sectionals and the SCNL Synchronized Skating Championships; at other events listed here, practice ice is provided subject to the discretion of the host committee.

Scheduling

Scheduling shall be the responsibility of the host committee in consultation with the Technical Representative and the Chief Data Specialist. No day of competition shall exceed 10 hours (not including practice) unless prior approval is obtained from the Skate Canada Newfoundland and Labrador Executive Committee.

Additional Categories

Additional categories may be held at the discretion of the host committee. These categories shall not be considered as qualifying categories for the competitions operated under the auspices of Skate Canada Newfoundland and Labrador.

STARSkate

The well balanced program criteria as outlined in the Skate Canada STARSkate technical package apply to all STARSkate freeskate, creative dance and creative skills categories held in the Section this season.

Helmets

Competitors in categories designated as “CanSkate” must wear helmets as recommended by Skate Canada. Competitors in STARSkate categories must be registered with Skate Canada in the STARSkate program, or if still registered in the CanSkate program must wear a helmet as above (e.g. a skater on a Beginner synchro team who is still registered in the CanSkate program must wear a helmet; all entrants in Pre-Preliminary categories must be registered in the STARSkate program).

Liability

Skate Canada, its clubs and/or organizers of competitions waive all responsibility for the damages or injuries suffered by skaters. As a condition of and in consideration for the entry therein, all competitors and their parents or guardians shall be deemed to agree to assume all risks or injury connected with the conduct and management of the officers. Entries shall only be accepted on this condition.

Skate Canada

In the case of disagreement between the rules and eligibilities outlined here, and those stipulated by the national body (Skate Canada), those of Skate Canada shall hold.

Additional information

Important supplemental information regarding technical requirements for competitions is produced by Skate Canada, and, when available, can be found in the Member’s Only section of the Skate Canada website. These documents may also be available on the Skate Canada Newfoundland and Labrador web site, but it is important to check the Skate Canada website to ensure the most recent version is being used. It is the responsibility of coaches and skaters to be familiar with

- Pre event technical packages for STARSkate, singles, pairs, dance and adult
- Short program elements for Pre-Novice to Senior competitive skate
- Well-balanced program criteria and required elements for synchronized skating

BMO Skate Canada Sectionals

The BMO Skate Canada Sectional Championships is the qualifying event for Pre Novice and higher categories for the BMO Skate Canada Challenge events.

Test Qualification Deadline

Before October 1 of the competitive year.

Age Eligibility

Age is considered to be the age of the skater before July 1, 2010.

Announcements

Announcements for the Sectional Championships shall be distributed not later than 8 weeks prior to the date of the first category.

Byes

The Skate Canada Newfoundland and Labrador Executive Committee may grant byes. Such requests shall be made in writing and received not later than October 20th of the competitive year. Medical byes shall follow the policies of Skate Canada.

Registration Fee:

\$100.00 per single part categories (pre-juvenile and juvenile categories except for dance), \$150 for categories involving two or more parts (dance categories, pre-novice, novice, junior and senior pair and singles). In addition a \$5.00 official and technology fee per skater is charged.

Eligibility

Skate Canada's rules for eligibility shall govern those categories, and are described in the association's current rulebook. There shall be no higher test restrictions for Sectional Competitors in all categories, apart from Special Olympic categories. Skate Canada Newfoundland and Labrador's rules for eligibility shall govern the Pre-Juvenile categories.

Awards

In accordance with Skate Canada's current rulebook; single entries have no competition and shall be considered an exhibition skate only

Coaching Accreditation

3M NCCP Level 2

The following categories will be offered in addition to Juvenile to Senior Singles, Pairs and Dance (eligibilities for those events are governed by Skate Canada, and their information should be consulted for details).

REGIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Regional Championships is the qualifying event for the Provincial Championships. Regional Championships shall be completed not later than the fourth Sunday in January. Regional announcements shall be distributed not later than 6 weeks prior to the start of the first category. In addition the Provincial entry fee shall be decided and indicated to the Regional Host Committees before each Regional competition

Test Qualifying Deadline

December 15th of the competitive year

Registration Fee

Not less than \$30.00 or more than \$40.00 per category +\$5.00 official and technology fee per skater.

Byes

All STARSkate Junior Silver, Senior Silver, & Gold freeskate; Silver and Gold skills; Silver and Gold interpretive; Competitive Skate; Special Olympic and ADULTSkate competitors shall receive a bye through the Regional Championships. Provincial Championship entry for byed categories shall be made directly to the Provincial host committee before January 15 2011. Byes may be granted in single entry categories for all regional championships. Such bye requests shall be made in writing not later than 7 days after the closing date for entries to the Regional Championships. It shall be the responsibility of the host committee to inform skaters of their bye status.

Medical byes shall be automatic in the case that a region has registered no more than their maximum complement of entries in a provincial qualifying categories.

Additional byes may be granted in extenuating circumstances. Such requests shall be made in writing with supporting documents to the executive committee of Skate Canada Newfoundland and Labrador.

Age Restriction

Age is considered to be the age of the skater before July 1, 2010. Competitors must be 18 years and under except for those entered in Competitive Skate categories, which are governed by Skate Canada age restrictions; all competitors 19 years and older receive an automatic bye to the Provincial Championships for ADULTSkate categories .

Skating up

Competitors may “skate up” one level higher than highest competitive or STARSkate test passed (note that pre-preliminary skaters may not skate up; and skating up is not permitted in interpretive categories). Skaters are only allowed to enter one category of similar nature, whether skating up or within their normal category (i.e. only one free program). In general STARSkaters skate up into STARSkate categories, competitive skaters skate up into competitive categories. Skaters in the STARSkate stream may enter competitive categories based on test equivalencies as defined by Skate Canada. STARSkaters may “skate up” in the competitive stream only in order to test in competition under CPC. Competitors who wish to skate up at Provincials must do so at Regionals also.

STARSkate Categories

STARSkate Regional and Provincial categories are open to competitors who did not register at the Sectional Championships in the current year in the same discipline.

Competitors who registered in Competitive Skate categories at the Sectional Championships are ineligible for STARSkate categories in the same discipline (i.e. a skater who competed juvenile singles at Sectionals may not enter Senior Bronze singles, but could compete in a STARSkate dance category; however a skater who has passed their Juvenile test but did not compete at Sectionals may skate both Senior Bronze and skate up to Pre-Novice short).

Other categories

Host committees are encouraged to add categories for skaters byed to Provincials to Regional Championships, depending on availability of officials. Similarly committees are encouraged to add pre-introductory interpretive categories for skaters who have not passed an interpretive test.

Single Entrants:

Non-qualifying categories where there are single entrants may be combined with the closest age group in the same category.

Winners:

The winner at a given test level may win at that test level no more than twice, irrespective of age. For example if a skater wins any Junior Bronze category twice they must skate Senior Bronze the following year (skating up if they have not passed the required test), even if they are eligible for a different age group in Junior Bronze. The exceptions to this rule shall be single entrants, and non-qualifying categories (apart from pre-preliminary).

Calculation of results:

CPC will be used wherever feasible, based on availability of officials. The same method of evaluation of skater and calculation of results must be used for equivalent categories in all regional events (i.e. CPC can only be used to judge Open women’s categories if it can be applied in all regional events).

Awards:

The top three placements in each category shall be awarded a prize. In a category where there are less than three entries, then the number of prizes shall equal the number of entries.

Provincial Qualifiers:

Women: Top three placements. In the event that any or all of the top three placements do not enter the Provincial Championships then the next placed skater in the category shall be considered eligible. If that skater does not enter, then the next placed skater should be considered eligible and so on. For example, if the 1st place, 3rd place, 4th place and 5th placed skaters decline to enter the Provincial Championships, then the 2nd, 6th and 7th placed skaters would qualify.

Men/Pair/Dance: All entrants; note that these skaters do not receive automatic byes and entry to provincials is via the Regionals event.

Skaters in qualifying categories must declare intent with respect to their participation at the Provincial Championships on their regional application. If this section on the application is not completed the skater shall be considered to have waived the right to proceed to the Provincial Championships.

Coaching Accreditation:

3M NCCP Level 1

Run-Offs:

If the OBO system of judging is used then a run-off shall be held when the number of skaters entered in a category exceeds 16 (11 for Pre-Preliminary categories). Run-offs will not be held under the CPC judging method. Skaters shall be divided by random draw into equal groups of 8 (or the closest whole number not exceeding 8). The top 3 skaters in each group shall proceed to the final. Awards are presented for the final only for qualifying categories. For non-qualifying categories, the event shall be divided with awards given for each group; no final is held.

Qualifying categories

Must register for Provincials through Regionals, entry fees and forms for Provincials will be collected and forwarded to the Provincial host by the Regionals committee.

Provincial Championships

The Provincial Championships normally are to be held in March. Provincial announcements shall be distributed not later than 6 weeks prior to the start of the first category.

Qualifying

Skaters must qualify through the Regional championships or through a bye as outlined in the Regionals guidelines (page 9). Skaters shall compete in STARSkate, Competitive Skate or ADULTSkate categories in which they qualified.

Age Restriction

Age is considered to be the age of the skater before July 1 2010. StarSkate competitors must be 18 years of age or under. Competitive Skate categories shall be governed by Skate Canada age restrictions; Special Olympics categories are governed by Special Olympics Canada guidelines; all competitors 19 years and older shall enter the ADULTSkate categories .

Entry

Application for qualifying categories at Regionals shall be made through the Regional Championships. STARSkate, Competitive Skate, Special Olympics or ADULTSkate categories that receive byes to the Provincial Championships shall send entry forms directly to the Provincial host committee to be received by January 15 2011.

Registration Fees

Not less than \$40.00 but not higher than \$50.00 per category + \$5.00 official and technology fee per skater (i.e. each skater pays the official and technology fee only once, no matter how many categories they enter). For example, a skater enters preliminary dance and preliminary freeski categories. The entry fee for that skater would be half the fee for the dance category (\$20), plus \$40 for the freeski, plus \$5 official and technology fee. The Provincial entry fee shall be decided and indicated to the Regional Host Committees before each Regional competition.

STARSkate categories :

STARSkate Regional and Provincial categories are open to competitors who have not competed at the Sectional Championships in the current year in the same discipline. Competitors may "skate up" one level higher than test/competitive level if they have done so at Regionals (see Regionals section; interpretive excluded).

Competitive Skate categories :

Competitive Skate categories shall be open to Sectional competitors and those who have met the test criteria before December 15 of the competitive year. Eligibilities for these categories shall be per the current Skate Canada Rulebook. Competitors who skated in Competitive Skate categories at the Sectional Championships are ineligible for STARSkate categories in the same discipline (i.e. a skater who competed juvenile singles at Sectionals may not enter Senior Bronze singles, but could compete in a STARSkate dance category; however a skater who has passed their juvenile test but did not compete at Sectionals may skate both Senior Bronze and Pre-Novice short). Competitors may "skate up" one level higher than competitive level. Skaters are only allowed to enter one category of similar nature, whether skating up or within their normal category (i.e. only one free program).

ADULTSkate categories :

ADULTSkate categories shall be open to competitors aged 19 years and older.

Special Olympics categories :

These are open to Special Olympians as defined by Special Olympics Canada. Eligibilities for these categories are as defined by Special Olympics Canada.

Compulsory Dance:

In the Pre Novice and Novice Compulsory Dance categories, the group to be skated shall be the same as the BMO Skate Canada Challenge. Junior and higher shall be the same as the Canadian Championships.

Winners:

The winner of a STARSkate category may win the category only once, irrespective of age. For example a winner of any Junior Bronze category must skate Senior Bronze the following year (skating up if they have not passed the required test), even if they are eligible for a different age group in Junior Bronze. The exception to this rule shall be single entrants who may win more than once; and entrants in categories where there is no category to skate up into. Competitive Skate, Special Olympics and ADULTSkate categories may have multiple winners.

Awards:

The top three placements in each category shall be awarded a prize. In a category where there are less than three entries, then the number of prizes shall equal the number of entries.

Coaching Accreditation:

3M NCCP Level 1

Qualifying Round

A qualifying round shall be held when the number of skaters entered in a category exceeds 21. Skaters shall be divided by random draw into equal groups of 12 (or the closest whole number not exceeding 12). The top 12 skaters shall proceed to the final.

Junior Provincial Championships

The Junior Provincial Championships is a non-qualifying event to provide CanSkate to Preliminary skaters 10 years and younger (11 and younger for men) an opportunity to gain competitive experience. The Canskate part of the event will be conducted following the guidelines of the Skate Canada Canskate elements technical package.

Test/Badge Qualifying:

Before February 1 prior to the Junior Provincial Invitational Championships

Age Restriction:

Age is considered to be the age of the skater before July 1 2010

Announcements:

Announcements shall be distributed not later than 4 weeks prior to the date of the first category.

Registration Fees:

\$30.00 per category + \$5.00 per skater official and technology fee

Entry:

Late entries will not be accepted.

Categories:

Boys and girls will compete in separate singles categories. Dance teams shall consist of a boy and a girl.

Flights:

Where there are more than 11 skaters entered in a category the skaters shall be divided by random draw into equal flights with the top 3 placements in each flight being awarded a prize.

Helmets

Competitors in categories designated as "CanSkate" categories must wear helmets as recommended by Skate Canada.

Registration:

Skaters entered in STARSkate categories must be registered with Skate Canada as STARSkaters.

Winners:

A skater shall be eligible to win a category once irrespective of age.

Awards:

STARSkate: The top three placements in each category shall be awarded a prize. In a category where there are less than three entries, then the number of prizes shall equal the number of entries. All participants shall receive a certificate of participation. All participation certificates and medals will be awarded at the medal presentation ceremonies.
Canskate: all participants shall receive an award based on standard achieved.

Skate Canada Newfoundland & Labrador Synchronized Skating Championships

This competition is a non-qualifying event for synchronized skating teams in Newfoundland & Labrador. Qualifying for the National Championships is through the Atlantic Regional Synchronized Skating Championships.

Team composition:

Teams may consist of members from different clubs. Clubs may join together to form a Synchronized Skating team if there are not sufficient numbers of skaters from one club to make a team. There are no test requirements for Synchronized Skating team members. A team must represent at least one Skate Canada club and, to enter Synchronized Skating Championships and Competitions, shall be registered with the Association as required in the Skate Canada Policies and Procedures and the Technical Handbook.

Team registration:

Clubs will be required to submit their synchronized team registrations to the Skate Canada National Office by November 1, and a copy to the Section office. Once registered, teams will not be permitted to change their category during the membership year.

Announcements

Announcements shall be distributed not later than 6 weeks prior to the date of the start of the event.

Registration fee

\$125/team for single skates, \$175/team for two skates, in addition to \$15 per skater and \$5 officials development and technology fee.

Helmets

Skaters registered with Skate Canada in the CanSkate program must wear approved helmets, irrespective of category skated.

Judging results:

Synchronized Skating Well Balanced Program, Levels of Difficulty and Scale of Values are as defined by Skate Canada and the ISU. Please check the Members Only Section of the Skate Canada and ISU web sites for updates.

All categories apart from Beginner I and II skate their program twice (NOTE: Junior and Senior have separate short and free programs). The final result will be the combined scores of the two programs, with the first counting for 1/3 and the second for 2/3 of the score.

No points are awarded for single entrants. Ties are awarded equal points (e.g. two tied for second each would get 4 points, no points for 3rd place awarded, next finisher would be awarded 2 points for fourth place)

Browning-Harvey most points trophy; calculated using points as for most improved.

"Sis" Reid trophy: This trophy was donated by CBS SC in memory of "Sis" Reid, a tireless volunteer in the skating community. It is awarded for volunteer efforts in support of skating.

CENTRAL REGION

Club trophy: Club points are totaled using criteria from Thistle Shield (Junior Provincials) Each club shall have a minimum of 9 skaters in order to be entered into the calculation of points.

Most improved club: The overall improvement in points from year to year is be the criteria for

this award.

The Most Artistic award is presented to the skater with the most artistic performance of the competition. This award is selected by the judges.

EASTERN REGION

The following awards are made:

Most Points Club Award: Calculated from all Club entries at Regionals, and awarded to the Club with the Most Points overall. Perpetual plaque donated by Conception Bay North Skating Club; Annual Keeper plaque donated by Region. Calculated by Data Specialists using following guidelines: 1st place - 5 points; 2nd place - 4 points; 3rd place - 3 points; 4th place - 2 points; 5th place - 1 point

Most Improved Club Award:

Calculated, by Club, from all Skater entries in each category at Regionals using the following guidelines:

- Points calculated as per best club award.
- While points are calculated for all categories, each team (dance/ pair) will count as one skater.
- Total points are divided by number of skaters in each club entered to give an average.
- The difference between this average and previous year's average is calculated and used to make the award (greatest increase in average).
- Calculated by Data Specialists.

The Hart Award: was presented by Trinity/Placentia Club in recognition of the many years of outstanding contribution by Shirley Hart to Figure Skating.

The award is presented to the skater who puts his/her heart and soul into his/her performance.

Criteria

- Skater selected by the Judges
- presented to the skater who the Judges feel put everything into their performance and really enjoyed skating at Regionals
- does not need to be a medal winner
- this award open to all Regional skaters
- this award is to represent the true meaning of figure skating- the love and enjoyment of the sport
